A New Look at Stewardship, Currency of Time and Place

The Currency of Time and Place seems obvious to most members of Christ the King. 1) Paid and volunteer time that leaders, members, and non-members offer to the ministry. 2) Property from which a ministry operates and other physical or virtual (online) properties owned or can be accessed by the ministry. However, there is much more to the Currency of Time and Place than one first thinks.



Much of our members' time and interaction with the community is beyond that spent at church or doing the work of CTK ministries. Similar to many

churches, the primary use of our property (pre-Covid) is once a week when we come together for Sunday services. While some members gather weekly or meet occasionally and community groups utilize our facilities on a regular basis, much of the property owned by CTK is used infrequently.

- What ways can we build upon our present Currency of Time and Place?
- How can we make the Cycle of Blessings of the Holy Currencies flow better and further into our community?

The first step is to complete a series of inventories to determine 1) how CTK members and employees use their time at church or toward CTK ministries and time away from church and 2) who uses our property, then when and how.

- What gifts and interests do members have to share with other members or our neighbors?
- Who in the community do members know that may lead to opportunities to build new relationships with our neighbors, establish trust to reveal their needs (truth) and new ways to serve our community?
- What spaces at CTK are available and when are they unoccupied?
- ♦ Who in our community could use space at CTK when we aren't using it?
- What can we exchange for our Currency of Time and Place?

The following is an example from Eric Law's blog, The Sustainist, of how a church put into action their Stewardship365 learnings by using their parking lot to connect with the community.

Church leaders realized while completing an inventory of the church property that the parking lot occupied the largest percentage of space. Through a year-long Holy Currencies workshop, they had learned about the Currency of Time and Place and began to explore how they could further use the parking lot. They wanted to exchange it for the Currencies of Relationship with neighbors and Money because they knew the roof of their church needed to be repaired soon.

They decided to offer their parking lot to food trucks one night a week in exchange for a 10% donation of each food truck owner's proceeds to the church's roof fund. Once a month they held a themed food truck event to reach more members of the community. Church members set up tables and chairs for people to eat then stayed to meet and listen to people in the neighborhood. While doing so, they built trusting relationships and discovered the truth about the needs and concerns of the community.

Church members responded to the needs and concerns by investing other currencies to provide wellness programs to create a more sustainable community. With donations from food truck owners and neighbors the church roof was repaired sooner than expected.

Your Stewardship committee is excited about the many ideas we've already noted to expand the use of CTK's Currency of Time and Place, the opportunities that will be revealed from the completed inventories and achieve our goal of becoming more relevant to our community!

EAGLE SCOUTS

CTK sponsors BSA Troops 447 and 2447 in supporting our community. Recently, Emily Kamalnathan and Bhavesh Kumar shared their respective scouting journeys to the role of Eagle during a Temple Talk as part of CTK's Sunday worship service. Their Eagle projects are shown below. Emily's Eagle Project is a pergola for Moreau Catholic High School to be used for gatherings. Bhavesh taught other scouts coding and they created an app for an audio tour and improved signage for the Mission Creek Trail between Driscoll Road and Palm Avenue in Fremont.





Nitin Srinivasa (Troop 447) also recently achieved this prestigious level in scouting. Nitin writes:

"We must change boys from a 'what can I get' to a 'what can I give' attitude." -Robert Baden Powell.

I joined Boy Scouts of America when I was in fifth grade. I had no idea what I was getting myself into and decided to go for it to meet new people. Some of the struggles I faced were spending my first week alone in camp, progressing through ranks, but now I am much more experienced and when I turn eighteen, I would like to become an adult leader in my home troop.

Some of the struggles I faced were spending the first week in summer camp. I was not accustomed to camp life. During camp we would need to roam around in many places while maintaining our proper mental and physical health. This was something I was not used to doing in a span of one week. Also, there were many hikes and I also got very dehydrated due to the hot sun

Another struggle I faced was progressing through ranks. In the first three stages or ranks of scouting, the ranks required scouts to learn and many, many skills and apply them while going on campouts. Some of these skills ranged from going on campouts to tying knots. Some of the knots were very difficult to learn and caused rank advancement to take longer. Also, when going for star, life, and eagle, we were required to be active for six months and earn lots of merit badges. This was difficult as when I got to high school, I had a lot of work and studying and this interfered with going to meetings and outings.

Furthermore, I struggled in planning and executing a service project, which is one of the hardest and most important requirements in becoming eagle. I had spent months reaching out to many people around my community and most of them were not having a project I can do. I looked all over the web to find some idea about a project I could perform and was not getting any idea about this. After multiple calls and emails to nonprofit organizations, I decided to send an email to a museum director asking if she had some project, she needed help with. The next morning, she invited me to the tule ponds and showed me many woodworking projects. I was very hesitant on my woodworking skills and was not sure whether the projects she suggested were something I can plan. I decided to build a retaining wall near a tractor path. The purpose of this wall was to block off floods and keep children safe on the trail. I had spent months planning and getting approved by the troop and district. I had finally gotten my approvals after few months. Then I needed to start collecting donations, calling hardware shops, and asking whether they would be willing to provide discounts for a service project.

I reached out to Home Depot and the manager was extremely kind to give me a donation, and help me with materials I needed. I had bought everything I needed except the wooden boards as they were not available the day I went to the shop. I had called around and a Lowe's in Union City had what I was looking for. I had notified my Assistant Scoutmaster Mr. Gonzales and he had helped me in buying the wood and bringing it to my house. I was also extremely grateful as he had given me the wood as a donation.

My next challenge was transporting the materials to Tule Ponds. I called adult leaders in my troop and one of the adults, Mr. Byard, had a truck. He was willing to help me transport all my materials to the project site.

My final challenge was getting enough scouts and adults to help me on the workdays due to COVID-19. I had spoken to all my neighbors and adult leaders once again. My neighbor and assistant scoutmaster, Mr. Connors had both helped me on the assembly and with everyone's effort, we had finished the project as planned. In my next stages of scouting, I would need to wait till I am eighteen years of age. I would like to become an assistant scoutmaster in my own troop. I would like to help the scouts that are younger than me have a fun and progressing journey in scouting. I would also like to take more leadership and lead the troop along with my fellow adult leaders. Eventually I would like to volunteer my time as one of the board members on the council or district to provide service to all scouts and troops.

All in all, scouting has affected me in my own personal life. It has helped me gain the idea of responsibility and maturity which I would not have gotten without scouting. It has also helped me gain many experiences such as camping outside and hiking which I would also not have gotten outside of scouting. - Nitin Srinivasa
