

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PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Saints!

What are your values? Not all of them, but your 3 most important ones in your life right now? Not an easy question, right?

During our worship on Jan 23rd, we did an exercise called "value mapping". The idea was to come up with ones personal 3 most important values in life. The results are a beautiful picture of why our congregation is so wonderful.

After everyone had shared, we grouped similar values. That way we were able to identify the 3 values most of us prioritize in life. Since people make a church, we assumed that those 3 values are our church's most important values.

They are:

INTEGRITY

COMPASSION

RELATIONSHIPS

In the upcoming months we are going to look at our ministries through the lens of our values. To see where they connect and where something might be missing. We will also talk to our sister churches about their values and hopefully find lots of common ground plus a tool to name differences.

Now, obviously those are great values for anyone to have. But what do they say about us as a church?

Relationships. We value relationships. Among ourselves and our members. With God. With our neighbors. That sounds very *churchy*. And very hard. Because relationships have to be built and tended. Especially when we disagree with each other. Or with God. Because it's OK to argue, it's OK to disagree. Even with God. Jacob disagreed with and wrestled with God. Job did, too, and never accepted a sentence he felt he didn't deserve. Jesus did and bargained for a sweeter cup than death by crucifixion. We can disagree and still stay strong in our faith that is our relationship with God. We can

disagree with each other and still love each other as members of the one body of Christ.

Integrity. The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles (per the English Oxford Living Dictionaries). Integrity doesn't mean that we will always be right or that we won't make mistakes or even hurt others through words and actions. Integrity means that we will own what we do and say, because we value relationships more than anything. And there are no relationships without integral truth-telling. Because the truth will set you free. And nothing else.

Compassion. It's what holds integrity and relationships together. It's what enables us to have

strong moral principles and do the work of building and nurturing relationships even when we are in disagreement. Compassion means to see things from the other person's perspective. To walk a mile in their shoes. To feel what they feel from the place where they are in. To be gracious because we tried everything to understand each other and to feel not just for but with each other. God showed us what that means when God died at the cross, suffering the worst pain. In compassion with a world in pain.

SAFE PARKING AT CTK COMING SOON!

CTK voted to move ahead and become a host site for the Safe Parking Program with the City of Fremont. This is a rotational program that we will be hosting for a month at a time. You are invited to volunteer! We will need volunteers to check-in people at night (between 6:30-7:30PM) and to check people out in the morning (around 6AM).

It's a great opportunity to connect with other volunteers and some of our unhoused neighbors. Volunteers will be screened and trained through <u>Compassionate Network</u>, an awesome Christian organization we have worked with before. BREEZE CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions made through our website are processed by Breeze. There is a fee for each contribution. The giver can either add an amount to cover it, or have it deducted from the stated amount. The net amount of all of the contributions made this way are deposited to our bank account once or twice a month. The full amount will appear on your Giving Statement as of the date you give it, not the date it is put in our bank account.

To save the amount of the fee, consider paying by computer directly from your own bank account. There is usually no charge, and recurring payments can be set up and controlled easily. Your envelope number can be used as the account number.

The Breeze button is great convenience for non members who are not regular contributors, but would like to support our ministries.

And I could feel him walk without moving his body towards his God with his God. And towards his mom, whom he has been missing so much in the past years.

Together with Bethesda we plan to have a celebration of life for Dennis around the time of his birthday in mid-May. His infectious smile will be missed.


