

But the experiences of the past 2 years have filled it brimful. Like me celebrating our reopening just 2 weeks ago, just to find myself in a totally changed reality upon returning from skiing. One could call that a lack in foresight. Or optimism turned into blindness. Or we can just acknowledge that change is omnipresent, that we are globally connected and that Covid, once again, has shown that to be true. It's a true Epiphany. Laying open what we knew to be true but thought we could easily forget until recently. That in our world nothing is one country's problem or one state's failure. That no one is safe until everyone is safe. That our attempts to build little islands of safety are doomed. That a virus cannot be banned, just defeated by all for all.

No certainty means that we have a lot of space for hope. And for God's surprises in our lives. When we have to wait and see and stop planning (which I really don't like!), we might have a good chance witnessing God's spirit at work. Again. Staying realistic and hopeful. Staying God's people. "And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us." (Romans 5:5)

IN-PERSON SERVICES PAUSED

Unfortunately, despite our heartfelt prayers, the COVID Omicron variant is raging through California, including Alameda County, which has seen a 10x increase in the number of reported cases (from 6 to 60) and a nearly 8x increase in the rate of positive tests (from 1.8% to 15%). Because of this dire environment, the Worship & Music Committee has recommended we suspend in-person services until the end of the month.

We know that this is discouraging and saddening, seemingly yet another blow to our struggles to reassert some normalcy and joy in our lives. We survived for 20 months; we can do it for one more!

At the end of the month, we will reevaluate the health environment and hopefully be able to fling wide the doors and resume worshiping face to face.

The City of Fremont has identified the first 4 congregations that will begin hosting unhoused neighbors living out of their cars for a month each. How wonderful, that we decided to be a part of this first cohort.

As of now, the launch is planned for January 31st when South Bay Community Church with pastor Tammy Long (who is also a member of our Jesus and Justice Collective) will host 15 cars. CTK hasn't determined yet when we will host, so stay posted.

The City started partnering with CityServe Compassion Network, a faith-based organization that we have already worked with for our backpack project in the past 2 years. CityServe will help find, train, and coordinate volunteers for the program. Members of our church will be prioritized to volunteer at CTK, empty spots will be filled with other wonderful people from Tri-City.

"Sewing Bees" help the community

When disaster struck back in March 2020, so did the desire to help those in the community. This statement sums up Christ the King Lutheran Church and its "Sewing Bees."

Sewing Bees are church members who have been making a difference in the community for quite some time. For years they have been sewing pillow cases for domestic violence nonprofit SAVE, care bags for cancer

patients and prayer shawls. But with so many people in urgent need of masks at the start of the pandemic, they expanded their generosity. The group was approached by social ministry leader Laurel King with the idea of making masks, and Sewing Bees took on the challenge with open arms.

The first few months started out slow, with supplies scarce and volunteers having to find simple patterns that everyone would be able to follow. Community members began graciously opening up their homes,

donating whatever scraps of fabric they could find lying around. This coupled with simple YouTube tutorials got Sewing Bees past their main obstacle.

Putting masks together was a fairly simple process, but still incredibly time consuming. Sewers had to start out by picking up materials, then washing and ironing each individual piece. From there Sewing Bees would cut out fabric and begin the assembly process, adding in nose pieces, elastic ear loops and inserts for a filter. Some sewers even included small



notes on how to wash and care for the handmade masks.

The group started to take off, sewing masks for a variety of different organizations such as Kaiser, nursing homes, Fremont Police Department, HERS Breast Cancer Foundation and Navajo People of Arizona.

"We would rotate through our group of organizations, calling to see how many masks they needed and if there were any specifications," says "Sewing Bee" Linda Pearson. "The police department asked for black masks to match their uniforms and Kaiser nurses would ask for a smaller size so they could give them to their kids at home, since at work nurses could only wear blue surgical ones."

Sewing Bees' largest project came about this school year, when they donated fifteen hundred masks to local school backpack distributions. "Lutheran Church donated three hundred packs, and in each backpack five masks. Seeing the kids light up as they received a bag with supplies for the school year was truly something special.

Everyone was so kind and I couldn't tell you how many 'thank yous' we received."

Along their journey, Sewing Bees made countless friendships with fellow Church members and others out in the community. They were met with support from everyone and people from all over offered help in any way they could.

"I just want to again thank everyone who helped us. None of it would have been possible without the support of the community and our church, Christ the King Lutheran. We were met with such a large amount of gratitude it was unbelievable. Everyone was so kind and it was wonderful to see what a difference we were making."

As the pandemic winds down, Sewing Bees are too, and production has been scaled back. They donated a total of 9,100 masks over the past two years, and are ready to jump back to their machines and rev up production the moment they are asked.
