

PASTOR'S LETTER


Dear spiritually filled Saints!

Safe Parking - Update

On May 13, 2021, the City's Planning Commission considered an ordinance to allow safe parking at private host sites, such as religious facilities and community non-profits as was discussed in last month's Table Talk. The proposed text amendments would create a ministerial permitting process through which community-based organizations and religious facilities could provide overnight safe parking at their owned or leased property for up to 20 vehicles.

The Fremont City Council is expected to consider the ordinance at their June 1, 2021 meeting at 7 p.m. The meeting agenda, which includes the draft ordinance, and instructions for public participation are available below:

Habemus Papam - After three intense days of Synod Assembly meetings on May 6th through May 8th the Reverend Dr. Megan Rohrer was elected as our new bishop starting July 1, 2021. Reverend Megan (41) is a wonderful theologian, a great chaplain, a strong ally for social justice, a parent of two young children, and an experienced community organizer. And they are the very first openly transgender person ever to be elected bishop!

Lutheran Lobby Day

The Lutheran Office for Public Policy (https://lutheranpublicpolicyca.org/) invites Lutherans from all over California once a year to come to Sacramento and lobby from the bottom of our faith for policies that mirror what we believe. This year, it was an online meeting with about 100 people: pastors and lay members alike.



Four of us from CTK were able to attend that day. Thank you to Roseanne, Bob and Bunny for taking the time! And it was amazing. Filled with the Spirit of Truth and Love, encouraged by the incredible Rev. Cornell William Brooks.

We learned how to advocate within 30 minutes (can't be that hard, right?), how to share stories and how to celebrate our voices. I had the honor to talk to Assembly Member Wicks and a staff from

Senator Skinner's office. Two meaningful and moving encounters with mutual story sharing (since we basically agreed on the importance of the bills anyways). **Update:** As of Thursday, May 20, 2021, 3 of our 4 active bills passed out of appropriations to the floor of their respective houses. AB 221: Emergency Food4All, SB 464: Food4All, and AB 937: The VISION Act (No ICE transfers) have the opportunity to continue to move forward in the legislative process. – *Pastor Tia*

Jesus and Justice Collective

A few months ago, Jessica Minter from the Bridges Community Church in Fremont reached out to us. She had learned about our efforts in working for a just world and starting conversations about racial justice and how to be anti-racist in word and deed. She wrote in an email: "We were very impressed with the steps Christ the King Lutheran Church has made toward racial reconciliation. Do you think your church would be interested in hosting joint educational sessions (virtually) to align more hearts with what God desires for us in this broken world?"

Needless to say, that I felt like this was an answer to my prayers: to connect more with other churches around concrete topics, and to work towards racial justice in our city and country.

They call their efforts the "Jesus and Justice Collective" (I love the name and am a little jealous that I didn't come up with it ②). Their hope is that the church, we as Christians, can take the lead in creating the much-needed change towards a just world.

On Monday, May 24th, Jessica brought together members from 9 local churches together (2 mainline, 7 non-denominational) to share our journey and our hopes. It was a true Pentecost to my heart. Christians, who could probably fight over quite some topics theologically, speaking the same language when it comes to justice that is grounded in our faith. Also, I learned that there are Evangelicals who are progressive Christians while loving their roots. Check out this podcast, that really blew my mind and made me

reconsider what I know about Evangelicals: https://www.holypost.com/ Also, I learned about a nationwide effort to dismantle racism as people of faith: https://www.faithandprejudice.com/ Also, if you are looking for a book study on "Building a Multiethnic Church. A Gospel Vision of Love, Grace and Reconciliation in a Divided World", Cornerstone Fellowship in Hayward will host a study starting June 17th on Thursdays at 7 – 8.30 pm for 5 weeks. (http://www.livingfreetoday.org/index.html) AND NO, I am not looking to send you off to other churches. But I do believe in shared learning and building relationships.

The idea is to share study material and host listening circles across our churches to strengthen our connections, faith and love for Jesus and Justice. To unleash our very own superhero powers. To make a change in our communities. – Pastor Tia

A NEW LOOK AT STEWARDSHIP, CTK Leadership Mini-Series / Building Connections

Your Stewardship committee has completed the training series with our Kaleidoscope Institute mentor and has begun sharing our learnings with CTK leaders in a three-part mini-series. During the first session in April, we provided an overview of the Stewardship365 program and delved deeper in the Holy Currency of Gracious Leadership. Last week, we met again to learn more about the Currencies of Relationship, Truth and Wellness. The mini-series wraps up later in June when we focus on the Currencies of Time & Place and Money.



Once the mini-series is completed the committee and CTK leaders will begin evaluating the current state of each currency. The committee will continue discussions about next steps, new opportunities to develop each Holy Currency and the format in which members will learn more about each currency.
