Pastor's Letter

Grace and peace to one and all.

Earlier in August, one of the Gospel readings for worship was Matthew 14:13-21. As you may recall, the story is about the feeding of the 5,000+. Just a few verses before this text is the beheading of John the Baptizer, a gruesome story. Our text picks up with Jesus and his disciples coming to know of this murder. Upon learning of the tragedy, in verse 13, we are told Jesus departs by boat to a quiet place, - or well, that was the intent. But having heard where Jesus was going, the people followed him.

Though we have a story with the amazing feeding of 5000+, we benefit from looking deeper into the story. I would like to lift up two of the many wonders and miraculous things going on in this story.

Those who have gathered are over 5,000, "not counting women and children." This crowd is comprised mostly of the poor, the oppressed, and probably heartbroken over the statesanctioned murder of John the Baptizer. Matthew shares that Jesus, moved by compassion, healed the sick and the weak. In the story we have these hungry folks in a hot, dry, parched area, barren of accessible resources.

In verse 15, the disciples tell Jesus: "This place is deserted and the hour now has passed; send the crowd away, in order that having gone into the villages they may buy food for themselves."

What was Jesus response to his disciples? Was it . . "I guess you are right . . . let us not be burdened . . . you are right we don't have enough . . . and if we send them away . . . even though they have not enough money to buy food . . . it is not our problem . . . I am not responsible."

NO! Jesus does something completely different. He says: "They have no need to go away; You give to them something to eat."

But the disciples' retort was: "We have nothing here except five loaves and two fish."

Jesus responded, "Bring them here to me."

The text continues with: "And having ordered the crowd to sit on the grass, having taken the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and blessed and broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowd."

The disciples are coming from a world view of scarcity: "we only have 5 loaves and 2 fish." Their impression is that there is just not enough to go around. We have talked a lot about this at CTK as we explore where God is calling us in ministry in the time ahead and what a mindset of scarcity does to a person's attitude. The mindset of scarcity limits our thinking to inward thinking instead of bigger-picture thinking. The troubling and destructive elements of greed, hoarding and self-centeredness, quickly stir within.

Jesus, in word and action, demonstrates to the community long ago and to us today that instead of a mindset of scarcity, good things happen when we operate out of the mindset of abundance . . . "thank you, God, for these five loaves and fishes." There is enough for everybody.

We need to avoid saying and feeling that the church "needs" more money, more members, more "help." That is a position and mindset of scarcity, even when we truly desire to act compassionately, "if only we had more money, more space, more volunteers, more . . . we could really do ministry."

Rather, we need to be thankful for that which we have been blessed, believing God has provided ample resources for us to do the ministry we are called to do. We need to continue growing in the belief that God has provided ample resources for us to do the ministry we are called to do. Planning and looking to grow is important. The idea of growing and embracing additional resources is not to be discarded, but scarcity should not be our mantra and not lamented.

The first point naturally leads to the second point: Jesus basically says to the disciples that this situation needs their participation and commitment. Jesus tells the disciples to get involved, participate, and reinforces that they are quite capable.

These reluctant, skeptical disciples are called to participate in the care for others. They are called to be a part of God working miracles in and through them, just as we are called to be a part of God working miracles in and through us. We are called to be the voice for those who are not heard, to respond to those who are hungry, those who are oppressed, those on the margins, to care for one another showing love and compassion. God's miracles continue when we help with Abode, SAVE, Safe Parking, leading and participating in bible study, volunteer in church administration and worship, volunteer on various church committees, and when we call on a friend who is sick or struggling with loneliness or isolation.

When you and I live into the call to love one another, to care for one another, through us, God is working the same kind of miracle we hear about in Matthew.

The real wonder of this story is that it continues: God still cares deeply and passionately for those who are most vulnerable – those who are sick, poor, without shelter, without food, the immigrant, – and God continues to work through us to care for them.

At first glance this is just a feeding story, but as you can see, there is much Matthew weaves into the story. May loving & compassionate God continue to strengthen you and provide you wisdom and mercy as you continue your journey caring for your sisters and brothers in creation.

Council President's Corner

It has been a very busy time since our last Table Talk was published in May. Thanks to the many hours Jason has contributed to the editing of our Table Talks. Due to time availability, he will no longer be able to continue in the role of editor. Thanks to Dana for taking this task on as one of her duties.

In July, we joined Holy Redeemer Lutheran Church (HRLC) and Holy Trinity Lutheran Church (HTLC) to celebrate Pastor Barbara Caine's 18 years of dedicated leadership in the Tri-City ELCA community. Interim Bishop Claire Burat delivered the sermon for this very special event, and the service featured diverse musical performances, including the Good Shepherd Telugu Choir, HRLC Hand Bell Choir, the Tongan Wesleyan Church Choir, HTLC Praise Band, liturgical dancing and more.

Members of the Ad-Hoc Committee continue in communication with HRLC and HTLC. Pastor Tim (HTLC) returned from his sabbatical in September. HRLC continues the complex process of the final stages of the HRLC ministry while both churches are working to move forward, together.

During the Synod Assembly, one of the workshops I attended was "Celebrate Small Churches" that Pastor Charlane Lines presided over. Out of 181 churches in our synod, 109 are considered "small." Many great comments and resources were shared which the Ad-Hoc Committee will be pursuing.

The Sierra Pacific Assembly with a theme of "Broken yet Whole" was held on September 15 – 17. Jim Sepeda and Jan Holbrook (non-voting) joined me as CTK's elected representatives. There were approximately 540 attendees of which 439 were voting members. Of the voting members, 67% were lay, and 33% were rostered.

A significant element of the Assembly was the receiving of La Iglesia Luterana Santa Maria Peregrina as a congregation. Public apologies were made for the racism and treatment they had received by the former Bishop and the Synod Leadership in the recent past. The recognition that damage has been done and healing is necessary was crucial. It was a very moving experience.

In the past three years, the SPS has had three Bishops and faced significant controversy. In addition, their offices have moved three times. There is declining membership and finances throughout the Synod. The Synod is looking for improved connectivity between the Bishop's office and the congregations as well as among congregations. This includes options for leading a declining church to new vitality, ministry for small congregations, the Call process, support and encouragement for rostered leaders and provision of well qualified interims.

At the conclusion of the Assembly, Rev. Jeff R. Johnson (Berkeley) was voted Bishop Elect on the 5th ballot with a vote of 226; Rev. John Kuehner was second with a vote of 168. 

SAVE Shelter Donation Bin In Narthex

SAVE welcomes these donations for their Youth, Teen, & Adult clients - both male & female, in various sizes:

Socks & Underwear, Shorts (drawstring), Slippers, Slip on Shoes, T-shirts, Leggings (female), Sports bras (female), Full Size Toiletries: Shampoo and Conditioners - various hair types, Body Soaps, Deodorant, Teeth care items (brush, paste, floss), Feminine Products - pads and tampons, Hair Brushes - for different hair types, Hair Bonnets - night sleep cap, Donations to CTK (note SAVE Project) are always welcome.



SAVE was founded in 1976 as a grassroots organization by a group of Tri-City women to provide support to survivors of domestic violence. At the time, there were no shelters in Southern Alameda County that could serve the specific needs of individuals and families experiencing DV. Other SAVE firsts include educating police officers and medical personnel about intimate partner violence (IPV), establishing a transitional housing program which won national recognition, and providing teen dating violence awareness presentations in schools.

SAVE shelter is a safe emergency space for victims and their children to stay after fleeing a violent environment. They often arrive with the clothes on their backs. This is a list of items needed to supply clients with clothing and toiletries until they can find permanent solutions.

The shelter is part of many of SAVE's community programs.

Safe Parking: Good News, Thanks & Prayers

Christ the King hosted Safe Parking in August 2023, the fifth time starting in June 2022.

There is good news. Two participants previously at CTK got stable housing in June, one in Newark and one in San Francisco. And three participants who joined the program during August were able to leave the program within a month. One got housing in Fremont and one in Oakland where she also started a new job. The third reconciled with a family member and has been given a place to stay. We can all rejoice with them and continue to pray for them.

A thank you note to CTK included these words:

I'm happy to report that I have rented a room in Fremont...I also want to express my sincere thank you to the church at large for allowing us to utilize your parking lot as part of the City of Fremont Safe Parking program. A special thank you is extended with a warm hug to all the volunteers...

The CTK Stewardship Committee hosted a meal for the participants on Thursday August 17 - Hot Dog August Night! It included grilled sausages and hot dogs. It was a fun evening and a time of great fellowship. Eight participants enjoyed the meal plus a few non-Lutheran volunteers.

Your generous donations made it possible to again give the participants gas cards. We hear regularly from some about how they limit their driving to conserve expensive gas. We also provided them with Starbucks cards, an appreciated treat. We will need to rebuild the Safe Parking funds for the next time we host the program, probably in January 2024.

A key prayer request continues to be improved relationships among the participants. A significant example, but not the only one, is that two participants left the program because of bullying by other participants, including off-site during daytime interactions. One of those who left had a mild heart attack during August and was told to stay away from the program by their doctor to limit stress. An unfortunate situation.

Typical overnight participant numbers for August were 5 to 8 participants, similar to April 2023. The maximum was 10 people and the cumulative people served over the month were 13; both these numbers are slightly higher than April.

We are thankful for everyone involved and that we continue to be able to help some of those less fortunate by providing them with a safer place to spend the night. We're always happy to add new volunteers.

Thank you to all who helped!

Since we started the Backpack Project in 2009, we have donated 1,172 backpacks to children in need.
