

## **PASTOR'S LETTER**

Dear people clothed in Christ!

What a joyous month it has been. Two baptisms within not even a week, that's quite a record for our congregation. And two candidates for baptism on both ends of the age and faith spectrum.

One baby, Eloise, who just started smiling at people, embracing everyone she meets, bringing instant joy to everyone who gets to see her. It even works over Zoom. I tried it. And one adult, a true lady, Carol, who also smiles and laughs a lot. Apparently, people who want to be baptized, are happy people. At least, that's what the CTK September qualitative analysis suggests.

Both baptismal candidates were clothed in beautiful dresses. Eloise wore a family piece her mom and auntie had already worn for their baptisms. A great symbol of how we become part of a huge, world-wide family of Christians of all times. Carol wore a white and light pink blouse. A strong image of the idea that life even at its hardest, even during a pandemic, can be light and bright when Jesus is involved.

Baptizing a baby and a mature lady within a few days, really shows what baptism is about. It's about pure grace. God gives it to us whenever the time is ripe. Eloise will grow up in a Christian family, with wonderful aunts and uncles, grandparents and parents, telling her about their faith. She will get to explore the Catholic tradition and our Lutheran ideas at Christ the King. She will listen to her brother Robert recite bible verses he learned at his school run by Prince of Peace. She will encounter God in different ways and at one

point, hopefully, be able to say YES to this God. No matter when or how that is going to happen, God's YES stands forever. God will not leave Eloise. That's a promise. Made in baptism. At the beginning of Eloise's faith life.

Of course, the same is true for Carol. And yet, Carol's decision to get baptized comes after a whole life of searching for God. Carol has felt the Holy Spirit very strongly in recent years. She started not only feeling the blessings God provided but also naming God as the source of them. Carol's baptism is not a beginning, it's a seal of her faith. God has already been with her, often unnoticed, waiting for Carol to find out. She did, of course. Because the Holy Spirit knows what she is up to when choosing to anoint people. In her baptism, Carol said YES to God's HELLO long ago.

## A NEW LOOK AT STEWARDSHIP

Merriam-Webster.com defines currency as "something that is in circulation as a medium of exchange." Money typically comes to mind when we hear the word currency and often is the primary focus of many CTK stewardship campaigns in the past. Alternatively, CTK learned from the Sierra Pacific Synod of a holistic model for stewardship and congregational vitality that looks beyond money used by many churches with impressive results.

Stewardship365 is an established program developed more than ten years ago by Eric Law, an Episcopal priest and founder/executive director of the Kaleidoscope Institute, centered on the understanding of six key aspects, or Holy Currencies, needed for a church to be sustainable and in relationship with the surrounding community creating a flow of blessings:

- Gracious Leadership
- Wellness
- Relationship
- Time and Place

• Truth

• Money

"The Cycle of Blessings is the dynamic exchange of these six currencies, flowing inward to renew and strengthen internal relationships and increasing gracious leadership capacity, and flowing outward to connect, discern the truth and foster wellness in the wider community." Learning how to develop, access and "flow" these currencies is an essential skill that members of the church must have in order for the church to be sustainable and missional"/in relationship with our community.

Our newly formed Stewardship committee has begun studying materials, attending trainings and working with our Kaleidoscope Institute coach. We will learn in depth about each currency:

What is this currency?

For what can this currency be exchanged?

How do we value and measure this currency in our ministry?

How can we develop this currency at CTK?

We will also be able to draw upon learnings from the Kaleidoscope Institute and other "Stewardship365 churches" who have successfully built upon existing programs or launched new ones or areas of focus.

Through this process, the Stewardship committee will work with our Kaleidoscope Institute coach to develop an extensive action plan and a year-around stewardship movement enabling our church to shift from maintenance to being in relationship with our community, from scarcity to abundance and from fear to grace.

In coming months, the committee will share our learnings about each Holy Currency and share activities that you can do yourself or with others. One simple, yet effective method is "mutual invitation". When sharing in a group, the first person talks and afterwards invites someone else to share. Who isn't ready to talk can either pass or pass for now. What's the great innovation? We find that we must be much more aware of who has spoken and who hasn't. It's truly helping the group process. – your Stewardship Chair, *Melinda Kufeld*

#### CHEMOCARE BAG MINISTRY

Our ChemoCare Bag Ministry had a setback due to mandatory quarantine orders. During that time, we also lost a valuable member of the team; Gail Queenan moved out of the area. Thank you, Gail, for sharing ALL your gifts and talents with Christ the King!

In March 2020, we received a large amount of donated fabric from Vicki Goss, one of our H.E.R.S. Breast Cancer Foundation contacts. The beautiful fabrics were the perfect texture and weight for lining the bags. Unfortunately, before we



could get to the store to purchase the complimentary outer fabrics, COVID-19 paused our good intentions. As luck or God's will would have it, I was able to find fabric enough for 4 ChemoCare Bags in our donation storage room in Carlson Hall. These bags plus 8 masks were delivered to H.E.R.S by Bonnie Immeker in June 2020, bringing our total number of bags donated to 88.

Now that the fabric stores are open for in-store shopping, our ChemoCare Bag Ministry is back in action. The perfect outer fabrics were purchased to complete an additional 9 ChemoCare Bags. We are also including two matching masks with each bag. These bags will be delivered to Vicki Goss so she can add her personal touch, filling the bags with puzzles, travel toiletries, a plush bear, a fleece blanket and other items before final delivery to a Chemotherapy patient. Your ongoing support and prayers are vital to this Ministry.
