Scope & Sequence

Because the 21-day challenge takes quite some time, we stretched the resources over the period of 5 weeks a 5 days (we all need to take breaks!).

Week 1: Introductions, the plan & the outcomes, introduce *Action Ideas* running list, share curriculum, discuss Circle Way **and** 21-Day Challenge (BELOW): **Days 1-5**

Question of the week: How do you think about your own racial identity and its relevance in your life?

Week 2: 21-Day Challenge (BELOW): Days 6-10

Question of the week: Where do you see racism in your community?

Week 3: 21-Day Challenge (BELOW): Days 11-15

Question of the week: Consider the institutions in which you participate. Where do you see institutional racism?

Week 4: 21-Day Challenge (BELOW): Days 16-20

Question of the week: Have you ever been criticized for being racist/ biased? How did you react? If that hasn't happened to you yet, have you ever witnessed such a situation?

Week 5: 21-Day Challenge (BELOW): Days 21-25

Question of the week: Is there one story that you have held onto that has informed your feelings about another person? (Need not to be a racially motivated memory.)

Week 6: Go to Running List & add to it; learn about actions taken by BIPOC-led groups and by our synod, learn about <u>Racial Equity Tools</u> and learn about the <u>Lutheran Office of Public Policy</u>

Week 7: Action Planning - Small Groups

Week 8: Sharing Out Actions & Getting Feedback, Schedule Follow-up Meeting within 2 months

Intro:

- The 21-Day Challenge concept was conceived several years ago by diversity expert Eddie Moore, Jr. to advance deeper understandings of the intersections of race, power, privilege, supremacy and oppression.
- The goal of the Challenge is to assist each of us to become more aware, compassionate, constructive, engaged people in the quest for racial equity.
- It has been intentionally crafted to focus on the Black American experience.

- While it is not the intention of the Challenge to cause offense, some participants may be offended by some language used in the lessons.
