

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Church!

That's the title of the book we are currently reading with our Book Club/ Bible Study at Christ the King. The subtitle states: "A love letter from a Black preacher to the whitest denomination in the U.S." It's a love letter to the ELCA by Lenny Duncan.

Let me say this: it's a true love letter. One of the kinds we rarely receive. It's full of beautiful images, personal stories. And it's full of truth. A truth we need to hear and ponder about and a truth that can be hard to stand.


Lenny loves the ELCA deeply. He sees the best in us. And he sees the many barriers that keep us from being who we want to be. We claim to be "welcoming to all". We claim to not judge people by the color of their skin. And yet, Lenny has quite a lot of stories to tell about microaggressions and racism he and other friends of color have experienced in our Lutheran churches. And yet, a Black seminarist looking for a first call often must wait for years because most churches still don't call Black pastors.

At times, the book is all harsh critique, all about the log in our eyes. Talking about how our liturgy follows a "Black and White" symbolism from darkness to light. Talking about how a white supremacist like Dylan Roof is not just coincidentally Lutheran. We at the book club have wondered: Why does Lenny stick to our church? And we have to answer the question: "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye?" (Matthew 7:3)

The answer is simple: Lenny loves the ELCA.

The openness, the unconditional love some people have shown him, the amazing grace given to us by God. When he first entered an ELCA church he ran into a pastor who invited everyone to the table of the Lord. Lenny had never experienced that before. When he was in seminary without a lot of money, some people from his church stepped up and bought him all the Christmas presents on his list. When he felt down and weary, there was always someone to catch him, pray for him, care for him, show him the love of God.

That's the most important lesson I take away from this



book. That there is hope. That we are resurrection people. People who don't get threatened to death by death. But people who open up tombs and follow the risen Lord. No matter how few might believe us at first.

What we as individuals do, matters. We don't have to wait for the entire church or

country to change. We can be the change and we will be the change. Day by day we can build the kingdom of God, a kingdom of justice and peace, filled with hope and love. Filled with backpacks for kids in Newark and with masks for everyone around us.

"We put money and resources toward what we care about in this church.", Lenny writes in his book. We do indeed. That's why I am so grateful to the people of Christ the King, Page 1 of 6 that we are going to put resources towards Racial Healing. Over the last months I have been developing a curriculum for a **Racial Justice Activation Circle**. This work has left me changed. I am much more comfortable talking about racism, talking about my own racist thoughts and behavior and I feel closer to my Black friends and neighbors. I will never entirely share their pain, but my heart hurts and my soul cries to God and my mouth speaks out against injustice. Starting **September 7**th, you are invited to join or continue that journey.

FIRE REPAIRS/GAS LINE REPLACEMENT UPDATE



The gas line repair project is complete!

The multiple underground gas leaks were not caused by the 10/31/19 fire but discovered when the gas was turned on after the fire. As such, these repairs are not covered by insurance. Total costs are \$45,000. Kidango generously donated \$10,800 towards the repairs. The remainder is funded by reserves.

As for the fire repairs, the exterior water proofing membrane has been completed and the stucco finish is scheduled to be installed the first week of September. The contractor is awaiting City approval for the electrical and mechanical improvements concurrent with the work being performed. Interior drywall will occur after the electrical and mechanical improvements.

PROGRESS ON THE 2020

"BACKPACK" PROJECT(S):

- On August 24th, Bonnie Immeker and Patricia Bauer delivered \$250 of supplies funded by a grant from Thrivent to the annual Fremont Kiwani's sponsored a Stuff the Bus event. Over 97 boxes of supplies were collected this year for distribution to students in need through the Fremont Unified School District.
- On August 28th, Melinda Kufeld fulfilled a request through CityServe Compassion Network from the City of Fremont Resource Center for 20 unfilled backpacks to be distributed to needy families.
- On September 2nd, CTK volunteers (Kris Adams, Steve Adams, Patricia Bauer, Pat Cote, Bunny Dubel, Bonnie Immeker, Bob Kufeld, Melinda Kufeld, Karen Mueller, Pastor Tia Pelz, Debbie Pollak, and Jim Sepeda) will be providing oversight and distributing 55 filled backpacks in Newark to families identified through the CityServe Compassion Network. Backpack contents include backpacks for all grade levels, highlighters, pens, crayons, binders, paper, scissors, calculators, and pencil cases as well as Target gift cards for the purchase of additional school supplies.

Thanks to your donations and the hard work of CTK Social Ministry, a total of approximately **\$3,200** in backpacks and school supplies have been donated this year.

This has been especially challenging this year of coronavirus since TriCity Volunteers no longer has the resources to help us with distribution of our purchased school supplies and the late decision for virtual learning.

A special thanks to Melinda Kufeld in identifying the needs of the Tri-city school districts and pursuing a means of distribution.

Because of the demand and the anticipated needs, we are continuing to accept financial donations for the "Backpack" Project as needs are identified throughout the year.



My experience actually started at 17, when the chaplain at Elmendorf Air Force Base in Anchorage, Alaska—where my dad was stationed—asked me to assist him playing on his portable organ as he drove between barracks at Fort Richardson on Sunday mornings. It's a long, windy road betwixt there and here, but I am who I am in many ways because of my work for the Church.
